Overview

At no time in American history has intelligence been a more important public policy issue. The collection and analysis of information to support decision making is at the forefront of government and supporting agencies.

The Summer Intelligence Institute offers participants a unique opportunity to study intelligence issues in the nation's capital.

Participants take part in a **six credit undergraduate and graduate joint program** led by the Maryland School of Public Policy. Faculty share their expertise as both scholars and practitioners in intelligence, diplomacy, international security, law enforcement and military affairs.



The Academic Program



The Summer Intelligence Institute will offer **two courses:**

- **INTELLIGENCE AND PUBLIC POLICY**
- **CRITICAL THINKING & ANALYTIC METHODOLOGY**

Each course educates participants about the intelligence community and its processes **through readings, seminars, speakers, and discussion of major themes** such as:

- the American legal and ethical context surrounding the integration of intelligence into a public policy process
- recent developments in the intelligence community
- critical thinking methods and their application to intelligence gathering
- similarities and differences between U.S. intelligence and that of other countries

The Institute will have the **faculty direction of Dr. William Nolte**. Dr. Nolte is the Director of the Program on Intelligence Research and Education at the University of Maryland and former Director of Education for the Office of the Director of National Intelligence.
