Voter Rationality and Politician Incentives: Exploiting Luck in Indian and Pakistani Elections

Madiha Afzal is a PhD Candidate in Economics at Yale University, focusing on development and political economy. Madiha's dissertation studies voting in elections in South Asia in order to understand voter rationality, political selection, and politician incentives.
